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1st jENS Congress 2015



Monitoring Stress of Preterm Babies

Swedish scientists published the new assessment tool “ALPS-Neo” for monitoring pain and stress of newborn infants. The tool is particularly interesting for caregivers in order to read the baby's cues appropriately and react accordingly.

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International Standards to Assess Size of Foetuses and Newborns

The intergrowth 21st project defined for the first time a common set of standards reflecting how babies should grow when mothers are healthy, well-nourished and receive medical care. The study makers now developed international standards for foetuses, newborn infants, and the postnatal growth period of preterm infants. More than 300 clinicians and researchers collected data from 27 institutions from all over the world to draft the standards. The findings make it possible to detect underweight and overweight babies worldwide and grant them adequate treatment.

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Restricted Use of Bromocriptine for Stopping Breast Milk Endorsed

The Coordination Group for Mutual Recognition and Decentralised Procedures – Humane (CMDh) endorsed recommendations to only use bromocriptine-containing medicines to stop lactation when there are compelling medical reasons such as child loss or HIV of the mother. The drug must not be used in women at increased risk of serious side effects. These include diseases that increase blood pressure or heart disease or severe psychiatric disorders.
