The role of nutrition and supplementation before, during, and after pregnancy

As part of our educational campaign “Healthy early nutrition – healthy future” we had the great opportunity to talk to Professor Liona Poon, Head for Maternal Medicine, Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the Chinese University of Hong Kong and Vice Chair of the FIGO Committee on Impact of Pregnancy on Long-term Health, about the causalities between nutrition, healthy pregnancy, and the well-being of mother and child. The expert also discussed how nutrient deficiencies can be counteracted with information and communication between pregnant women and their doctor.

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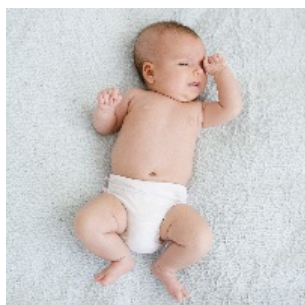
PROTECTING AGAINST PERTUSSIS

New video explains how pertussis vaccination during pregnancy works

Pertussis, also known as whooping cough, is a serious and highly contagious infectious disease which is particularly dangerous for infants, especially those born preterm. The good news: if the mother gets vaccinated during the third trimester of pregnancy, the antibodies her body produces in response to the vaccine pass to the baby before birth. The baby is thus born with some protection against pertussis. In many countries, including Austria and the United States, this vaccine has long been part of healthcare services during pregnancy. Wanting to raise awareness for the dangers of pertussis for newborns, EFCNI has now developed a short video which explains how the vaccine works and why it is a good protective measure against the disease. The video is freely available and also meant as tool for healthcare professionals to use it when educating patients about the issue. Please note that the video, just like the entire campaign, is in German.

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ADVERTORIAL – RAISING AWARENESS OF RSV

Do you recognise the “Sounds of RSV” in babies?

For many countries in the southern hemisphere, RSV season is just starting. Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is a common, contagious virus that infects the nose, throat, and lungs, making it hard for an infant to breathe. Most children will contract an RSV infection in their first two years, and although it usually only causes mild, cold-like symptoms, some serious cases can be life-threatening. For babies who are at high risk, such as those born preterm, recognising the symptoms of RSV infection is therefore critical. Our corporate partner, AstraZeneca, has developed a microsite about what the symptoms sound like in their the “Sounds of RSV”.

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HEATWAVE-INDUCED PRETERM BIRTH

The impact of climate change on preterm birth health and human capital

Heatwaves can increase the risk of preterm birth (PTB), which in turn will affect physical health and human potential over the life course. In the current study, researchers assessed the number of PTB cases in China over the past decade that are attributed to heatwaves, emphasising those induced by anthropogenic climate change. To evaluate the heatwave-related PTB burden regarding health, human capital, and economic costs, they combined three dimensions (i.e., health, cognition, and noncognition) of human capital and analysed the most common short- and long-term outcomes of PTB, such as neonatal mortality and reduced IQ. Results showed, among other things, that about a quarter (25.8%) of heatwave-related PTBs per year on average can be attributed to anthropogenic climate change, which further result in human capital losses of an estimated more than 1 billion USD.

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GLOBAL RELEVANCE OF BREASTFEEDING

Protective role of breastfeeding in reducing the duration and severity of RSV bronchiolitis in infants

A recent systematic review including 17,000 children from 19 studies concludes that breastfeeding has a positive impact on RSV-associated acute lower respiratory infections (ALRI). Evidence suggests that the severity of ALRI associated with RSV and factors such as hospitalisation rates, length of hospital stay, and additional oxygen support is reduced when infants are exclusively or partially breastfed. 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STUDY ON THE LONG-TERM IMPACT OF PRETERM BIRTH

Family environment affects the socio-emotional development in children born preterm

Many different aspects influence the development of a child. Biological effects of preterm birth increase the risk of several diseases, whereas the influence of preterm birth on the child's social, behavioural, and educational development are not yet investigated as well. Now, researchers from Ireland examined if the family environment and the parent-child relationship influence the social-emotional development of preterm-born children differently than children born full-term. The results show that children born preterm had more socio-emotional difficulties and lower language- and numerical-abilities in late childhood and early adolescence.

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REVISION PHASE

Public consultation well underway

All healthcare professionals, parent representatives, and other stakeholders are warmly invited to take part in the revision process for the European Standards of Care for Newborn Health (ESCNH). This year, some 76 individual standards are up for review. The objective behind the public consultation phase is to enable the wider community to contribute to the ESCNH by sharing their perspectives and insights. The consultation is

accessible via an online survey and is still open until the end of June.

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WEBINAR ON KANGAROO MOTHER CARE

Launch of Kangaroo Mother Care Global Position Paper and Implementation Strategy

On 16 May, the World Health Organization (WHO) is going to publish a global position paper and implementation strategy on Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC), following the release of new guidelines for the care of preterm or low birthweight infants in 2022. According to these, KMC is recommended as the essential standard of care for all babies born too early or small. Programme partners, policy makers, and the broader public health community are invited to participate in the webinar to discuss these two recent resources and hear from key stakeholders in newborn health about their plans to support implementation and scale up of KMC for all preterm or low birthweight babies.
