Putting the needs of preterm babies on the political agenda in Romania

Our partner parent organisation in Romania, Asociatia Prematurilor, spearheaded an initiative to improve the care for preterm infants in Romania. In cooperation with ABC (Association of Education for Children) and high-ranking Members of Parliament, they introduced the "Premature and Newborn at Risk" carnet and a motion to establish Kangaroo Mother Care in all hospitals in Romania. Both initiatives were debated in parliament, and a law based on these proposals will be drafted. Congratulations to all participants for their dedication – it is inspiring to see their efforts come to fruition!

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CONFERENCE

In the Czech Republic, a congress and an award to celebrate World Prematurity Day 2023

Our Czech partner parent organisation, Nedoklubko, celebrated World Prematurity Day 2023 by illuminating at least one building in each city with a neonatal unit to, quite literally, highlight that doctors and nurses save newborn lives in these towns. What is more, they organised a prestigious conference in Prague. Held on 15 and 16 November, the congress saw a diverse panel of experts from a range of professions discuss how to ensure that preterm infants receive the best possible start in life. EFCNI's Chairwoman of the Executive Board, Silke Mader, opened the second day of the conference with a keynote lecture. Nedoklubko also hosted the Purple Hearts Awards which honoured those working with preterm infants for going above and beyond the call of duty.

SCIENTIFIC PREEMIE CHAT

First scientific chat format on immediate Kangaroo Mother Care

The Canadian Premature Babies Foundation (CPBF) hosted their first scientific chat introducing the controversial question: In infants born less than 26 weeks, do you practice early skin-to-skin care within the first 72 hours? Moderated by Dr. Souvik Mitra and EFCNI's Chairwoman of the Executive Board Silke Mader, a panel of experts debated the World Health Organization's recommendation on immediate skin-to-skin care for survival of small and preterm babies and whether NICUs really follow these guidelines for the smallest and most vulnerable babies, especially those born under 26 weeks of gestation. 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HEALTH POLICY

WHO identifies research priorities to improve the care of preterm and low birth-weight infants

After more than five years, the WHO has renewed its recommendations for the care of preterm and low birth-weight infants. Almost half of the recommendations are completely new, reflecting the needs and knowledge development of recent years. Associated research questions prioritise the new guidelines and highlight particularly important topics in neonatal care. Those include the demand to find ways to increase exclusive breastfeeding and family participation in the newborn's care as well as finding out more about the effectiveness of non-invasive ventilation and Kangaroo Mother Care.

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THE POWER OF FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

Examining the great potential of family-centred care at the NICU for newborns and their parents

The stay in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) can lead to a physical and emotional distance between parents and their newborns. A recent study highlights the effective steps implemented at Children's Hospital Passau to alleviate this separation by introducing a Family-Centred Care (FCC) approach. This strategy enhances the emotional well-being of both infants and parents by involving families personally and

granting them unrestricted access to the NICU where they actively participate in treatment decisions. Notably, family involvement seems to act as a safeguard, reducing the risk of neonatal sepsis and enhancing the physical health of the newborns.

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NEW PROJECT PAGE IS LIVE

ArtPlac – research project on an ARTificial PLACenta device for preterm and sick newborns

Initiated by the European Union, a group of 10 institutions and organisations is developing a novel medical device called ArtPlac. This device aims to replace invasive techniques and to act as an artificial placenta by offering lung and kidney support while also providing essential data to healthcare professionals. A central goal of the project is to encourage infant- and family-centred developmental care by allowing much closer contact between the patients and their parents or caregivers. EFCNI ensures the involvement of patient and parent representatives throughout the entire project.
